

# **Safety First!**

#### Riding in Extreme Heat

As the red goes up in the thermometer, the potential for heat exhaustion, heat prostration and heat stroke become increasingly more

likely. If you are out on your bike on a long ride, make sure to hydrate frequently and fully with each stop. Riding in the extreme heat with all your riding gear can feel like someone blowing a 50" hot blow dryer at you. Drinking liters of water may not result in complete hydration as your body works extra hard to cool down. If you see the signs of heat exhaustion, heat prostration or heat stroke in yourself or others, pull over, rehydrate, rest and recuperate for as long as it takes. Destinations are not as important as a life.

According to an article I read, "Watch very carefully for signs of Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke. Your body will send you signals that it's having trouble with the heat, which can include cramps, nausea, headaches, extreme fatigue, flushed or pale skin, dizziness, and heavy sweating" (The Lost Adventurer, n.d.).

Another tip is to bring a lot of water. Plan to have more water than you might normally drink on a ride. It is better to have more than you need and have to bring it home than it is to be out in the heat and run out with no water source in sight.

Plan not only for "water stops," but for "cooling spots/stops." It may not be enough to just stop, rest and re-hydrate. You may also need a means to cool down, like being able to get out of the heat into an air-conditioned space, or having a pool to take a dip in or even just a hose with running water to soak yourself in to get your body temperature under control.

It is tempting to ride with bare arms and legs; however, covering your body will actually allow it to cool more efficiently as sweat is not evaporating like steam on hot pavement. You will be surprised that the people who have the most difficulty staying cool are those with the most exposed skin. As the heat and the wind hit your skin, any moisture that is there evaporates and may end in dehydration much faster. It might seem like a crazy thought to be covered fully in the heat when riding, but it helps your body work better at staying cool.

If you do not want to wear leather, then wear textile materials with vents or the newest in cooling wearables. You will find cooling vests, scull caps and other evaporative cooling wear at <u>Gemplers</u> online. There are other places to purchase these types of wearables that provide protection from the sun as well as keep you cool. Look for a "cooldana" on Amazon.com - "You just saturate it with water, and wrap it around your neck. Occasionally dribble some water on it and it will continue to cool all day" (Hough, 2017).

Remember, dress to stay cool, stay hydrated, ride safe and stop when you need for as long as you need. We want you to come home safe and sound.

## **Safety Last!**

#### Keep your head on a swivel for safety

I was going to write a segment on how to navigate a turn and talk about how our bikes are engineered to take and go through turns, a skill that some master right away and others need a demonstration and practice. But a recent tragedy hit really close to home and it convinced me that we should talk about this tragedy and how to hopefully avoid it from happening to any of us.

My friend was riding his motorcycle to work on a nice sunny day. He was moving along on a major local highway. Passing through a small township, the traffic, as it often does, came to stop for someone making a left turn. There were two cars in front and my friend stopped center-behind the

car in front of him. It is common for new and even experienced riders to stop at the center point directly behind the vehicle in front of them like they are in a cage and pull too close without leaving an escape route. Unfortunately, the next thing that happened was a rear end collision and my friend was killed. In looking at the accident, it appeared as if he had left himself nowhere to go and no way to escape. The im-

pact drove him and his bike into the car in front of him.

What we can learn from my friend's loss is that when we come to a stop on a motorcycle, we have to understand just how exposed we really are. There are a few things we can do to help protect ourselves and it starts with how we approach that stopped car. As we approach, we need to look to the sides of that car and ask ourselves which side has more room. We need an out, a spot where we can move to get out of the way. As we pull up to a stopped car, aim the bike to the side with the most room to maneuver

so that the front of the bike is clear of the vehicle and an escape route is clear.

Remember to keep the bike in gear and look in both mirrors to watch traffic. If someone is coming up fast, we can get out of the way. Look around, are there bike riders? Someone who is not paying attention? People walking dogs? We really need to keep our heads swiveling back and forth and look around 360 degrees. Swiveling and scanning is something that experienced riders do all the time, looking and knowing who and what is around, and always look for an escape plan when it looks like it is needed. After practicing for a few months scanning and stopping with an escape route, it be-

comes second nature.
Scanning and planning is a survival tactic, a skill I want you all to think about and cultivate to help keep safe.

I want us all to have a long and fulfilling riding life as we are all friends and family. If you would like to practice, a good place that is set up marked for making slow turns, stopping suddenly and practicing other lifesaving riding skills is at the Hillsboro Stadi-

um Parking Lot. If you would like to know more about how to develop these skills, reach out to me or another road captain or seasoned rider. We all continue to practice whether we are new to riding or have been riding for years.

# **Hog History!**

History of Harley Owners Group (HOG)

HOG has been associated with Harley as early as the 1920s. The Harley-Davidson Wrecking Crew racing team had a pig as a mascot and gained the nick name as the "Harley Hogs." In the 1970's when Harley was owned by American Machine and Foundry (AMF) the quality, poor performance and handling of Harley bikes known as HOGS was used as a derogatory term for Harley bikes at that time.

Today, of course, we know the HOG acronym for the Harley Owners Group which many of us display proudly on our jackets and vests. HOG clubs only official existed since 1983 when Harley-Davidson created the club and today is the largest factory-sponsored riding club in the world.

Hopefully soon, I will have origin history of the HOG Sunset Chapter to share with all of you. I have found Swineline news editions as early as 1992 when Sunset HOG was under Harley-Davidson of Beaverton. Please share any information you may have on our history with me (david@sunsethog.com).

#### PHOTO FORMATS

All photos must be submitted online at hog.com/abc. Photo formats accepted are .jpg, .gif, .png. Each photo must not exceed 5MB in size. NOTE: Images must be clear and names/signs must be legible in submitted prints. Prints that are blurred, fuzzy, illegible, or unrecognizable will not receive points. Photos may be used for multiple categories by uploading the same photo for each category. Dealership photos used for city, state and province points may be used. Please upload the same photo for each category.

#### PHOTO ELEMENTS

- Your Harley-Davidson motorcycle must be in each photo. A Harley-Davidson' Authorized Rental motorcycle is also acceptable.
- The second page of these rules is the 2017 H.O.G. Touring Handbook cover that you can print and start your ABCs adventure today.
- You, the entrant, must be in at least five of the photos.
- · An "official sign" must be in each photo. An official sign is defined as:
- A government building with the name of the city, village, town, county, state, territory, or country on it. An example of a government building is a post office, city hall, or police station. Examples of items that WOULD NOT count as a government building are libraries, vehicles, schools, water towers, and museums.
- An authorized Harley-Davidson dealership may be used to designate a city, state, or province, plus it may be used to obtain up to 10 H-D¹ Dealership points. Photos of the dealership must include the dealership building with the name of the dealership on it. The first letter of the actual city where the dealership is physically located is the letter for which you will receive a point. For example, Harley-Davidson of Charlotte is physically located in Matthews, NC so you would receive credit for the letter "M" for a photo of that dealership. For photos of dealerships, the name of the city and state of the dealership must be included in your description before submitting.
- A sign posted by a government body that is physically located within the boundary of the place it identifies. Mileage markers and directional signs do not qualify.

#### **HOW DO I EARN POINTS?**

- Photos may be used for multiple categories by uploading the same photo for each category. Dealership photos used for city, state and province points may be used. Please upload the same photo for each category.
- One point for each city, village, town, township, or municipality sign from A-Z. Only one point per letter. (26 points maximum)
- One point for each county, parish, or district sign from A-Z. The word "county," "parish," or "district," or the abbreviation equivalent, must be on the sign as well as the name. Only one point per letter. (26 points maximum)
- One point for each U.S. state. The name of the state or abbreviation equivalent must appear on the sign. (50 points maximum)
- One point for each country. The name of the country or abbreviation equivalent must appear on the sign.
- One point for each Canadian province and territory. The name of the province or territory, or abbreviation equivalent, must appear on the sign. (13 points maximum)
- One point for each U.S. National Forest sign. The name of the forest as well as the words "National Forest" must appear on the sign. (5 points maximum)
- One point for each individual Harley-Davidson dealership. (10 points maximum) Dealership photos used for city, state, and province points may be used. However, a separate photo must be submitted for each point.
- One point for each U.S. National Park Service (NPS) managed site and for each National Park or Provincial Park in Canada. The NPS logo with name and/or the name of the park, historic site, lakeshore, monument, etc. as well as the words "National" or "Provincial" must appear on the sign. Visit nps.gov for U.S. parks and pc.gc.ca for Canadian parks. (5 points maximum)
- Canadian Provincial/Regional and U.S. H.O.G. Rallies or H.O.G. Pin Stops
  as listed on hog.com/events. The rally photo must clearly show you
  (the entrant) and an official rally banner or a national Harley-Davidson
  staff member. H.O.G. rally event banner may not always be accessible
  with your motorcycle. In that case a photo of you, the entrant, at the
  location and holding a 2017 HOG magazine or the 2017 H.O.G. Touring
  Handbook will be accepted. This is the only situation that does not
  require your motorcycle in the picture.
  - Two points for each 2017 International Rally (outside the country you reside) that is listed as the National Rally for that country.
- Two points for each 2017 U.S. H.O.G. Rally or Canadian Provincial/ Regional H.O.G. Rally.
- · One point for each 2017 U.S. or Canadian H.O.G. Pin Stop.
- Points as listed below for each of the following Harley-Davidson Motor Company facilities. (12 points maximum)
- · Two points for Juneau Avenue Headquarters in Milwaukee, WI
- Two points for Pilgrim Road Operations in Menomonee Falls, WI
- · Two points for York Vehicle Operations in York, PA
- Two points for Kansas City Operations in Kansas City, MO
   Two points for Tomahawk Operations in Tomahawk, WI
- Two points for Harley-Davidson Museum\* in Milwaukee, WI (Please do not park on sidewalks while taking your photo at the Museum.)

### Meet Your Road Captains!

### Meet Jeff Miesen



Jeff rides a 2010 Ultra. He likes it because he got a good deal and it is a nice bike to ride for every day. His favorite bike overall has been a 2007 Electroglide, a bike he totaled. He is happy with his 2010 Ultra and has no plans to get a new bike any time soon.

Jeff started riding when he was 7 years old. He rode a Honda Trail 50, blue and silver with his mom on the back. He had a picture of them back then. He says, "I tried to recreate the picture some

years ago, but mom didn't want to get on the bike." Jeff says that he has "always been riding. Something I've always done, went from mini bikes, to a Honda 50 to a Trail 90, had a '74 Harley somebody gave me in a box, which I sold." What he likes most about riding is "The feeling that I'm flying next to the ground."

Jeff says he became a road captain because he had an idea for a ride and presented it to the road captains. "They said if you want to lead it, you should become a road captain, so I did. I like being in the front," he says. Jeff shared that his most fun ride was the first year he did the Crater Lake run, which is a 3-day run. He also likes the 2-day ride out to Hot Lake in Eastern Oregon, a ride he is leading again this year. His favorite ride is Klickitat Canyon. "This was my first ride with the Chapter in 2003. This was a ride through the Canyon at an unusual pace."

Jeff's suggestion to novice riders is to seek out the book titled "The Proficient Motor-cyclist," which gives advice on how to ride a bike. Most of what the author said is how Team Oregon does their training. He also says, "Don't be afraid to come on a ride."

Jeff was looking forward to going to the North Meets South. "It's going to be new and different for me." He says that he would like to go to Crater Lake and is looking for-

ward to doing the Hot Lake ride again. He says, "my wife has made a suggestion for me to do a ride out to St. Johns, Newfoundland, about 5,300 miles one-way. We could do this ride through the Canadian Route or go through Sturgis and the Northern Route." He hasn't decided as yet.



### Meet Your Road Captains! - cont. Meet Harry Dickerson aka "Fuzzy Face"



Harry rides a 2013 Ultra Limited. He likes it because it is a smoother ride than the other bikes he has owned. This bike is a touring model and is easier to control on the roads having a faring. He says that when it rains or there is bad weather, the faring protects him and he really likes the cruise control.

Harry's first Harley was a 2005 Wide Glide. It had forward controls, was an easier ride and was designed with a dyno, meaning you could really feel the road. Harry sees an Ultra CVO in his future; a top-of-the-line bike with stainless steel cables, chrome, heated seats and is one sharp

looking bike.

Harry started riding at age 16. His parents bought him a brand new 1968 Yamaha 180 for \$300. He got into riding because he "had a couple of friends who had a Suzuki and I used to ride on the back of it and when I found I could get a Yamaha for 300, and it was cheap to get around the city and not that many kids had motorcycles back then." What Harry likes most about riding is "the freedom in the air. I have a 360-degree view of where I look when traveling. You can travel through the back roads," and he likes the thrill of riding something that has some danger, plus the freedom of the road.

Harry became a road captain after being approached by Roger Smith, SR Road Captain. "I found out [Roger] was the new SR Road Captain and he was recruiting and I thought because I've had a lot of fun with the HOG group and I thought I'd give back." And... Harry likes to ride. His most fun ride was "Last year when I went with the Bucket of Blood ride to Virginia City, NV. I was riding with a bunch of other people with the HOG group and it was fun going through a new territory and towns with a group of people. I

had never been in some of the places, like Reno, and my son was along, too, on his own bike."

"I have instilled the fun of riding into my children. My oldest and my youngest both have rides. 2007 Low Rider (oldest) 2007 Heritage Softtail (youngest)." He also went to Sturgis and Minnesota with his sons 2 years ago, another fun ride. He says, "I enjoy going to the Coast with the group. Riding through the coast mountain ranges, that is the fun part." He looked forward to the Grist Mill Ride.



### Meet Your Road Captains! - cont. Meet Lance Kretlow



Lance currently rides a 2015 Electroglide limited. He likes all the creature comforts (boom entertainment system, includes GPS and blue tooth for the phone) and he enjoys the ability to make phone calls through the bike – all hands free, mic and ear phones are in the helmet. His favorite bike was a 2010 Heritage. He said, "I really enjoyed riding that bike. I traded up. I was ready for the creature comforts. It was a fun bike to ride. I think all the soft tails are fun bikes to ride. The maneuverability is phenomenal." He is hoping that he does not have any new bike in his future "unless it's a Tri-Glide."

Lance started riding when he was 6 years old and rode a mini-trail 50 Honda. He said, "My folks were trail riders. They road on-road and off road on trail bikes back in the day." He likes most about riding "the freedom of not having the cage around you and being able to enjoy the sights and smells and things you are kind of restricted in a car, especially in the Spring when everything is blooming. The Northwest has a distinctive smell in the Spring."

"I became a road captain in 2010. I was kind of a hot-rodder and I needed to cool my jets and becoming a road captain and riding in an organized group is something I felt like I needed. I've ridden moto-cross and raced moto-cross... I made the transition about 20 years ago from the dirt to the street." My most fun ride was when "I took a group from the Chapter to Sturgis two years ago. That was a fun ride. I got to ride some roads that were incredible through Yellowstone Park and that was an experience I am not soon to forget. Last summer we rode through the Redwoods in California. That needs to be on everyone's bucket list. It is a ride that you will not soon forget. When we started riding Harley's, my wife and I started riding together. We are really in it to ride and learn new rides." Lance's favorite ride is the Klickitat ride, one that he leads every year. He says he really wants to ride route 66. "I want to be able to go down through Texas and all the way up to Chicago on Route 66."

His advice to novice riders: "Practice. Practice. Practice. Providers. You lose your skills by not riding regularly. It is so important that you practice, even if it is around your neighborhood. I still find myself learning things that I didn't know I was capable of handling on my big machine." For all those seasoned riders he says, "share your knowledge with others. There are so many people in our Chapter that have rides in their heads; please share these with others."



### Meet Your Road Captains! - cont. Meet Gary Sutherland

Gary rides a 2016 CVO Limited and likes this bike because it handles really well. This bike has been his favorite overall. He shared that this bike was his dream bike and that it has everything on it that he really really likes.

Gary started riding with David Brown when he was about 7 or 8 years old. He started out on a Hodaka Super Rat. When asked what got him into riding, he said, "David Brown did because he sold me a 400 Honda Goldwing. I drove it back and forth to work a few times one summer and then I sold it. I rode bikes when I was younger. The real reason I got into Harleys was because of a good friend who had



this theme party at his house titled "ALFEST." He belonged to a club and when I walked up there, they had parking spaces on the driveway with their names on the fence to park their motorcycles. When I got to the end of the parking lot, my name was on the fence and there was a little model motorcycle in the parking space and a note that said "just add water."



It was 4 years after that I got myself a Harley when the girls graduated from high school because we had put a lot of stuff on hold so me and my wife decided to go look at the motorcycles. The new ones and the used ones were close in price and I got my first motorcycle on Father's Day in 2006. I wrote a check for it and I then got my own financing and they gave me the check back, so I kept that check. I still have that check. My next bike, I ordered directly from the factory. I bought it on 12/10/2011. We got it for Christmas and I pulled it in the house and parked it in front of the Christmas tree."

Gary likes the freedom, the camaraderie and the solitude of riding. He enjoys doing some of his riding on his own, but it is fun to hang out with friends, too. His favorite ride goes like this: It took "32 days to go across the United States. It was an awesome trip. We originally started going to the Milwaukee Harley Davidson Museum and my wife wanted to go

and we saw friends and relatives. We saw the HD museum, went to the Indianapolis 500 and rode on the track, then went to the Corvette Museum. We went to the Kentucky Derby, until we were asked to leave as it was not a race day. Went to Washington, DC, Fredericksburg, VA, NYC ground zero, Atlantic city, Savannah, Daytona, Orlando to Disneyworld, Key West (best time we've ever had in our lives in September when there was no one there – went on 2 cruises that held 60 people, but there were only 18 and 23 and we did all kinds of fun stuff). We camped in a campground in Virginia Beach and got to see the air show at the Naval Air Station. We went to Long Boat Key and got to stay at the mayor's house (Gary's uncle). Went to Pensacola and came back up through Shreveport, LA back up to Denver, CO and then headed back to the Pac NW."

Gary has been riding with David Brown for a very long time and says he became a road captain through strenuous urging from his wife and his best friend, David Brown. He became a road captain before David did and then strenuously urged David to also become a road captain, which David did. Gary offers this advice to new and novice riders: "Pay attention. Be aware of your surroundings. Ride safe. Ride at your comfortability, not someone else's." For seasoned riders, he says to be as safe as you can.

Gary looks forward to riding to new exciting places, someplace they have never been. "We like to go on new trips and see new things. Since we've owned our Harley, we have seen more and more things that we've never seen before. We have hit a couple of the places that Guy Fieri has showcased on Diners, Drive-ins and Dives, which as great." For rides that they have not yet taken, they would like to see Mount St. Helens, Cedar Creek Grist Mill, and go on another trip across the US next year in September to Niagara Falls and Maine.

Gary says, "I like to participate in activities and rides that surrounds Veteran's activities. I ride with the Patriot Guard and I enjoyed the ride to Summerplace this past weekend. We need to honor our Vets that have been overseas."

David Brown, also our Historian, rides a 2016 Ultra Limited Low, which he purchased to replace a sportster. This bike will comfortably transport both him and Angela. This bike is his favorite bike of all because he and Angela share the ride. He says that maybe someday he will buy a CVO because it has everything.

David was 6 years old when he started riding. He rode dirt bikes that his dad held him up on because he couldn't quite touch the ground. "When I was in grade school, there was a janitor that had a Honda Goldwing. I remember thinking back then when I grew up I wanted one of them. As I got

older and I learned about Harley's, I decided I had to have a Harley." He shared that it wasn't until he became a young adult that he really stepped up his riding by purchasing a Yamaha 250. He says that his Air Force buddies were all riding Honda Rebels at the time and they would go off to ride around Mt. Rainier, so when he got the opportunity to buy the Yamaha, he took it. He started out with the Yamaha 250, then bought a Honda 450 with a faring, which was his primary commute vehicle, then moved up to the 2006 Sportster 1200. He had the Sportster for 3 years, then purchased his current Harley.

David likes to ride to feel the wind blowing through his hair, experiencing the freedom of the road and all the smells, good and bad. "The most fun ride was to Sturgis last year. I would like to do that one again and again and again, as well as going through the different places like Yellow Stone. Angela went with me and it was our first long ride together. I left my Rain Gear behind and won't be doing that again. I would like to ride to Sturgis every year. I know that I will not go every year, but every time I do go to Sturgis, I will go a different route." Some day he would like to ride to Street Vibrations in Reno, Nevada and one day cross the United States.

David became a road captain because he was recruited "and it piqued my interest into deciding it was this something I could I really do. I have ridden all my life, and I had street experience. I was on the Sportster for 3 years. I was on the Ultra Limited for 6 months and then approached as a good rider and recruited. I get to lead rides, that is good." David's advice to new and novice riders is, "just take it easy. Do not do more than you can handle. Go on lots of rides

and talk to experienced riders." For seasoned riders he shares, "Keep the rubber side down. If you get your adrenaline going, you are no longer on a comfortable or relaxing ride. Ride where you are comfortable and back off if you need to."

David also shared that "joining the H.O.G. group, being active and meeting people has been enjoyable. Getting to know people and other riders that can share things is a great riding networking opportunity."

An hour later we pulled into their parking lot and found that they had done a very nice job




> valley near and right along the Willamette River. There are nice sweeping curves and you can still kind of look while you are ridina.

and more riders showed up, Roger informed Gary and I that since we were the only two that did the pre-ride, both of us would have to be the lead ride cap-



#### **Summerplace Assisted Living Community Outreach**








stop, The Dalles and the Oregon Veterans Home.

Some riders like to make all the stops, but


