
Editor's Note


Welcome to April's Swineline!

1966 was a very difficult time in our country's history. We were fighting a war in Vietnam to which many people were adamantly opposed. Those in opposition wrongly held those who served in the military and

fought in that war responsible instead of the privileged old white men in Congress who sent them there. Serving in the military during that time took an extra measure of bravery. Not only did you have to face the real prospect of dying in war but of being criticized and judged for serving at all.

I was not one of the noble and heroic soldiers we often hear about. I was part of an even larger group who really didn't know why we were there or where we were going. In my third year at Oregon State University, I realized at about 3am one morning the week before finals that I didn't know why I was in college or what I would do with a degree if I managed to get one. I packed my gear and was gone without a word to anyone before sunrise. I stopped in a coffee shop and scanned the classifieds for possible jobs. I saw an ad for jobs in a plywood mill and, given my total lack of knowledge of that industry, decided to drive to Coos Bay and go to work on the "green chain", sorting both lumber and my life.

Surprisingly, this didn't do a lot for my grades which were marginal in the first place. I earned all F's that term except for a D in a PE class I didn't bother to attend even once during the term. The school sent me a letter saying don't bother to come back. That was followed shortly by a letter from the Air Force pointing out that a condition of the ROTC program I was enrolled in was that I would immediately be enlisted in the Air Force if I dropped out of school. The letter went on to say that, after reviewing my record, they didn't want me either.

Life at the mill was just as glamorous as you would imagine with time off spent drinking beer in a dark back corner of a local tavern where nobody noticed that I was an 18 year old who looked 16. Within about 6 weeks, I received yet another letter. Greetings; this is your draft notice. You are to report for duty next month. That ended my career in millwork prematurely and sent me down a whole new path.

True to the stereotype of being a "child of the 60's", I rebelled against any authority that would tell me I needed to report for duty - by doing the only logical thing available to me at that point – I enlisted. Even now after many decades, it is not clear what the hell I was thinking. It really doesn't matter though. I was now in the Army (for 3 years instead of the 2 that draftees are committed to). I attended Basic Training at Ft. Lewis and then Advanced Training at Ft. Ord.

Tell Me A Story. You May Save My Life

Some of you were at the March meeting, but for those who weren't, I told a story of how I thought I was being so defensive while I ride. It turned out I was not quite right. So not right I put myself in real danger; even though I was watching and ready for the cage to make a wrong move.

You see, I was traveling on I-5S just passing the I-205S interchange (as

many of you know there is long sweeping on-ramp from I-205S). So, as I'm riding I'm looking at the on-ramp traffic and noticed a cage matching my position and speed and both of us would end up side by side when we are on I-5S.

My cruise control is set and I decided I better watch this cage in case he decides to change lanes farther left into my lane. I'm watching him closely....I decide to cover both brakes so I'm ready if needed. Well guess what? Oh sure! YOU GUESSED IT. One quick blink of a left turn signal and over he comes. I jumped on the brakes and narrowly miss a serious accident. I was very proud of

myself for being ready, for being such a defensive, observant and prepared rider.

As the days go by though, I could not stop thinking about this incident. Why, I thought did I just not let it go. All of a sudden it came to me. I couldn't stop thinking about it because I realized I had really screwed up. The cage hadn't put me in danger. I had put myself in danger when there was no reason to be there. I could have easily avoided the situation, avoided the concentration, avoided the covering my brakes and then having to use them. How? Simple, just speed up or slow down so I would not be beside the cage at all. What an easy way to escape danger. I hope "I" learned a good lesson about "real" defensive driving. Maybe this could give you pause for thought on your own safety while you ride. I hope so.

The other story I told was about how I used to sit around the airport my father managed for the city of Caldwell, Idaho and listened to all the pilots tell their stories of the close calls they had while flying. Some were more than close calls, but they survived. I always found them very interesting. I stored all those stories and how to prevent their errors from happening to me in the back of my mind.

H.O.G. Mileage Program

The Mileage program is just another way that H.O.G. is taking care of their Active H.O.G. Members, so why pass up them tracking your mileage and sending you patches and pins for your mileage accomplishments.

To enroll all you need to do is fill out the Mileage Program Enrollment Form and take each of your Harley's to your local authorized Harley Davidson dealership and have the dealer verify your odometer reading. Mileage accumulated prior to enrollment is not eligible for consideration. Don't forget your Passenger; if they are an Active H.O.G. member they can participate too! Fax or send the form to H.O.G. and they will send you an official Mileage Program patch and pin for enrolling.

Then it's easy...occasionally run by a Harley Davidson dealership to fill out the form after your long rides and get your odometer reading verified by the staff at the Harley Dealership and fax or mail it in. When you reach the mileage markers below H.O.G. will send you a patch and pin for that mileage you accomplished. (*Special medallions and rockers, suitable for placement on your Harley-Davidson motorcycle, will be awarded.): 1,000, 5,000, 10,000, 25,000, 40,000, 60,000, 80,000, 100,000*. 125,000, 150,000, 175,000, 200,000*, 250,000, 300,000*

The miles still accumulate even if you sell /trade your Harley. Submit the H.O.G. Mileage Program form when your Harley is sold/traded

indicating the ending mileage reading for the old Harley along with the vehicle identification number and starting mileage of the new Harley. You can even obtain mileage accumulation when renting a Harley from a Harley-Davidson® Authorized Rental. Miles may be credited by submitting a copy of the contract, which indicates mileage accumulated. When you rack up those miles and receive your patches; let us know at the Chapter meeting...we would love to help you celebrate your accomplishment.

So it's time to rack up those miles with all the adventures this year from our Chapter rides, PNW H.O.G. Rally, Rally in the Valley, starting the ABC Touring with H.O.G. and for those making the trip to Sturgis.

Meanwhile I submitted an application for Officer Candidate School (OCS). There is room for serious debate over which was crazier – me for applying or the Army for accepting me. In any event, I was soon on my way to Ft. Knox, Kentucky for 6 months in Armor OCS. Upon graduation, I was given my first assignment as a new Second Lieutenant – Tank Platoon Commander in a small community near Nurnberg, Germany. After a year in that assignment, I was directed to report to the 4th Armored Division Headquarters south of Stuttgart to interview to be the aide to the Commanding General. I indicated that I really wasn't interested. The reply was, "Oh, in that case, be there at 8am tomorrow morning."

When I showed up for the interview, the Chief of Staff asked me why I was interested in the position. I indicated that I wasn't and had been directed to report for an interview. I was then sent to G-3 to interview for a position there. I again said I really wasn't interested. My orders to report for duty as the Division G-3 Air (the guy who calls in air support to support the folks on the ground) beat me back home. My day job as the G-3 Air (anytime we weren't in the field training) was to provide the training ammunition (we used trainloads of it) for the Division. Probably the single thing that best exemplifies my time in the Army, was a small going-away gathering in which I was presented with both an Army Commendation Medal and a formal letter of reprimand in the same ceremony. I did a damn good job; I just couldn't get myself to do it "their way".






Pacific Northwest H.O.G. Rally

So again my thanks to all ya all who came to this GRO, and even more thanks for making me and the rest of our great RC's look so good.


